I drove by the next day about halfway through that snow and you couldn't tell a bit of difference between their driveway and everyone else's driveway. There is a time and place for deicers and this wasn't one of them. Deicers are all salts. It doesn't matter if it's fertilizer, it's still a salt. Too much applied too often can damage the concrete and can damage the soil on either side of the hard surface. Deicers should be used sparingly and then given plenty of time to work. Don't wait until the last minute and then coat the driveway or sidewalk. Scrape off as much snow as you can prior to it getting packed down. Packed snow and ice will be melted with deicers. Apply sparingly and uniformly and then just wait! I'm Chuck Otte and this has been Gardening with Chuck.

Don't Toss the Christmas Tree
